
The afternoon was marked by a strong sense of community and purpose, with proceeds supporting our outreach to children and families in need. We wish to acknowledge those who mailed in

The raffle included a wide selection of items, and the gift cards were especially well-received. The process of placing tickets into the bags went smoothly, and the American Heritage Girls (AHG), Troop 1212 assisted with prize



distribution—an addition that helped the process run efficiently.

The auctions and raffles contained wonderful items that our Acquisition's Guru, Bernie Chuinard, obtained. The items totaled over \$18,000.00 in value.

providing helpful assistance throughout the event.

The Dine-Around-Town raffle was a welcome addition. CCST tried this again this year as it had been a staple at fundraisers a decade ago. Nancy's coordination was key, and Ann MacDonald & her daughter Maggie helped with ticket sales.

A highlight of the afternoon was the Book Vending Machine Paddle Call. The room rallied together to meet a \$6,000 goal—and in a generous gesture, Father Vu of Santa Catalina Parish matched the donation, funding a second machine. We're grateful for this unexpected but welcome support.

The first machine will be awarded to St. Ambrose Catholic School. with ribbon cutting August 22. The second machine made possible by Santa Catalina will be awarded to Immaculate Heart School, where Sister Veronica serves as principal. It is scheduled for delivery in July, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on August 8.

These machines serve a unique purpose. Teachers distribute tokens to students who meet academic or behavioral goals—such as improved grades or attendance—which can be redeemed for a new book the child keeps.





Helping Others in Need: Creative Giving of SaddleBrooke Ranch Linda Shannon-Hills & Dian Gowen (Co-Leaders)

Creative Giving SaddleBrooke Ranch (CG-SBR) has been a significant contributor to CCST. Every month they supply us with bibs, burp-cloths, blankets (sometimes all three items are matching which really make the Layette Ladies happy). They also are very good at making baby toys and we

continue to be blessed by their generosity and talent. Each month we see a new toy, whether it be a hedgehog or a knitted ball with crinkle paper. All these items are so beautifully made and the mothers of the newborns that receive them are thrilled to own them.

So in addition to the Layette and Foster Teen items that they provide us each month, they are a great example of their name. They are certainly creative and they are certainly giving!

So many people in the world are in need foster care babies, young children, and teens, as well as older adults. Over the past two years, CG-SBR has made more than 2,000 items for various charities in the area. It is amazing that they are so productive. They have 37 active members. Almost half of their donations come to CCST. So far this year they have made items valuing over \$8,500.00.

In addition to helping CCST with layette items and drawstring bags for foster teens, CG-SBR also helps people in need in the SaddleBrooke Ranch community who may be having a knee or hip replacement, a sports injury, or pain doing regular household chores.

They provide over 16 hand made items (rehab pillow, walker bag, neck scarf with pockets, etc.) to their neighbors to help relieve some pain, provide convenience when recovering from surgeries, or make every day living a bit easier.

I'm incredibly proud to share that our Layette Program is flourishing, thanks to the hard work of our dedicated committee, the generous leadership of Fr. Huy Vu, Pastor of Santa Catalina, and the continued support from the SaddleBrooke community of seamstresses, who lovingly provide handmade items such as blankets, bibs, balls, and more. A heartfelt thank you to everyone involved in making this ministry thrive.

The past three months have been especially fruitful. We received a generous donation from St. Augustine High School's Lenten collection, and with the invaluable assistance of Dr. Ana, we are expanding our ability to serve even more mothers and families in need.

We are also working to deepen our involvement with the Walking with Moms in Need program—a national initiative that encourages parishes to accompany and support pregnant and parenting women in practical and compassionate ways. Looking ahead, we are hopeful for continued growth and new opportunities to serve.

As we approach the end of our fiscal year in June, the Layette Committee is on track to distribute 600 layettes—a testament to the commitment and generosity of all who support this program.

What is Walking with Moms in Need?

Walking with Moms in Need is a U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops initiative encouraging every parish to become a beacon of mercy for pregnant and parenting women. As Pope Francis reminds us, our parishes must be "islands of mercy in the midst of a sea of indifference."

This initiative invites Catholic communities to "walk in the shoes" of mothers in need by:

- Accompanying them with friendship and care
- Connecting them to local resources and support services
- Conducting a parish-based inventory to identify gaps in assistance

- Staffed by 100 employees statewide
- Currently praying for a certified ultrasound technician


Christ Child Society: Bringing Comfort and Connection
